

## What is the Biblical Worldview

### Who is responsible for our children learning the Biblical Worldview?

1. Parents.
  - a. Moses in Deut. 6:5-9 lays out how, and he is talking to parents here and specifically Fathers. [SLIDE], *Deut. 6:5-9 (ESV), 5 Love the Lord **your** God with all your heart and with all **your** soul and with all **your** strength. 6 And these words that I command **you** today shall be on **your** heart. 7 **You** shall teach them diligently to **your** children, and shall talk of them when **you** sit in **your** house, and when **you** walk by the way, and when **you** lie down, and when **you** rise. 8 **You** shall bind them as a sign on **your** hand, and they shall be as frontlets between **your** eyes. 9 **You** shall write them on the doorposts of **your** house and on **your** gates.*
  - b. So parents are the primary persons responsible for the education of their children especially in teaching the biblical worldview, but there are three others that play a supplemental or supportive role
2. The Church
  - a. *Matthew 28:19 (NIV) Jesus says, [SLIDE], 19 Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.*
3. Family and Friends
  - a. *2 Timothy 1:5-7 (NLT), Paul writes, I remember your genuine faith, for you share the faith that first filled your grandmother Lois and your mother, Eunice. And I know that same faith continues strong in you. 6 This is why I remind you to fan into flames the spiritual gift God gave you when I laid my hands on you. 7 For God has not given us a spirit of fear and timidity, but of power, love, and self-discipline.*
  - b. *2 Timothy 3:14-15 (NLT) 14 But you must remain faithful to the things you have been taught. You know they are true, for you know you can trust those who taught you. 15 You have been taught the holy Scriptures from childhood, and they have given you the wisdom to receive the salvation that comes by trusting in Christ Jesus.*
  - c. *1 Timothy 1:2a (NLT), 2 I am writing to Timothy, my true son in the faith.*
4. Schools, Maybe?
  - *Kristen Bird, Answers magazine says, [SLIDE], regardless of the schooling your children receive: homeschool, Christian school or public school they will spend over 15,000 hours in school before they graduate.*

- a. Bird says, [SLIDE], without careful oversight, students, having a sin nature, can easily become secularized by the influences they encounter in all those school hours.
- b. The number one defense that we can have while encountering these worldviews is to personally understand the biblical worldview and consistently be involved in what kids are a part of: school, activities, etc, so we can be able to have those discussions to counter what they are being taught, and in some cases address concerns with the schools where our children are attending.
