FINISHING WELL

Quick review:

QUESTION: What Prevents us from Finishing Well?

Shift #1: Self-Reliance

1 Sam 27:1a (NIV) But David thought to himself

Shift #2: Pessimism

1 Samuel 27:1b (NIV) One of these days I will be destroyed by the hand of Saul.

Shift #3: Rational Logic

- 1 Samuel 27:1c (NIV) The best thing I can do is to escape to the land of the Philistines. Then Saul will give up searching for me anywhere in Israel, and I
- ² So David and the six hundred men with him left and went over to Achish son of Maok king of Gath. ³ David and his men settled in Gath with Achish. <u>Each man had his family with him</u>, and David had his two wives: Ahinoam of Jezreel and Abigail of Carmel, the widow of Nabal.

⁴ When Saul was told that David had fled to Gath, he no longer searched for him.

⁵ Then David said to Achish, "If I have found favor in your eyes, let a place be assigned to me in one of the country towns, that I may live there. Why should your servant live in the royal city with you?"

⁶ So on that day Achish gave him Ziklag, and it has belonged to the kings of Judah ever since.

Are you drifting away from God today?

¹² Achish trusted David and said to himself, "He has become so obnoxious to his people, the Israelites, that he will be my servant for life."

David had 3 main consequences:

1). David loses his Identity

1 Samuel 29:6 (NIV) So Achish called David and said to him, "As surely as the LORD lives, you have been reliable, and I would be pleased to have you serve with me in the army. From the day you came to me until today, I have found no fault in you, but the rulers don't approve of you.

7 Now turn back and go in peace; do nothing to displease the Philistine rulers."

2). David loses his Satisfaction

1 Samuel 29:6 (NIV) So Achish called David and said to him, "As surely as the LORD lives, you have been reliable, and I would be pleased to have you serve with me in the army. From the day you came to me until today, I have found no fault in you, but the rulers don't approve of you.

7 Now turn back and go in peace; do nothing to displease the Philistine rulers."

3). David becomes Miserable

1 Samuel 30:1 (NIV) David and his men reached Ziklag on the third day. Now the Amalekites had raided the Negev and Ziklag. They had attacked Ziklag and burned it, ² and had taken captive the women and everyone else in it, both young and old. They killed none of them, but carried them off as they went on their way.³ When David and his men reached Ziklag, they found it destroyed by fire and their wives and sons and daughters taken captive. ⁴ So David and his men wept aloud until they had no strength left to weep. ⁵ David's two wives had been captured—Ahinoam of Jezreel and Abigail, the widow of Nabal of Carmel.

David was greatly distressed because the men were talking of stoning him; each one was bitter in spirit because of his sons and daughters.

1 Samuel 30:6 (NIV) But David found strength in the Lord his God.

⁷ David lived in Philistine territory a year and four months.
